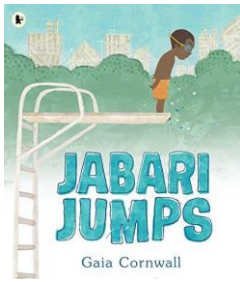
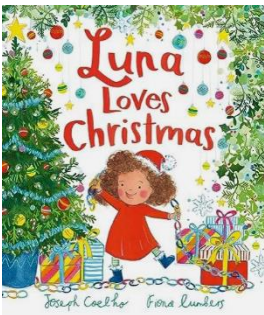
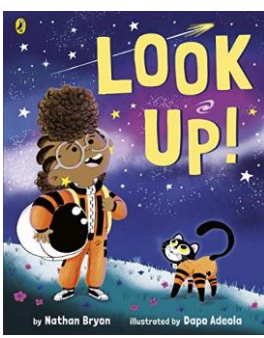


# Mirrors and Windows Texts

***“Diversity is the one thing we all have in common. Celebrate it every day.”***

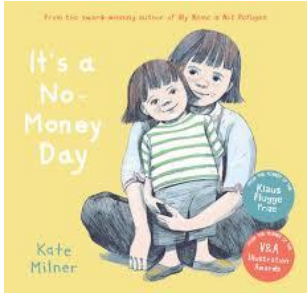
	<p><b>Celebrating Diversity</b></p> <p>A story everyone can relate to! This story is a visually unique way of communicating positive ideas about inclusion and diversity.</p>
	<p><b>Worry and Anxiety</b></p> <p>‘I’m jumping off the diving board today’ says Jabari when he visits the swimming pool with his dad and sister. It’s a bit high, a bit scary. ‘It’s OK to feel a little scared,’ says his dad. A story where children will identify with Jabari’s fear and bravery.</p>
	<p><b>Celebrating All Families</b></p> <p>Sometimes Luna spends Christmas at her mum’s, sometimes at her dad’s. This story explores the dynamics of spending time between two houses and celebrates separated families.</p>
	<p><b>Main Character from Minority Cultures</b></p> <p>An aspirational story about a child with big ambitions who wants to be an astronaut one day. This book celebrates a main character from an ethnic minority group.</p>

	<p><b>Current Challenges in Society</b></p> <p>A story that captures the emotions of struggle, resilience and hope articulating with dignity, an experience which a child may have.</p> <p>A poignant and empathetic book that shines light on a subject that should concern us all.</p>
	<p><b>Neurodiversity</b></p> <p>Meesha loves making things but finds it difficult to make friends. Hiding in a quiet corner at a noisy party Meesha discovers she is not the only person who finds it tricky. A book to help children recognise their own feelings and how others might be feeling too.</p>
	<p><b>Speech Delay</b></p> <p>When the boy in this story starts to speak, the words get stuck. On bad speech days, he stays ‘quiet as a stone.’ His dad helps him see how his voice bubbles and churns like a beautiful river. A book to help children understand stammering.</p>
	<p><b>Celebrating All Cultures</b></p> <p>Omu makes a big pot of thick red stew. Knock, knock! One by one, friends and neighbours follow their noses and Omu shares her dinner. A joyful story of food and community.</p>
